REPORT OF PROGRESS AND APPLICATION FOR FUNDING FOR 2008 TWIG: PARASITES OF FISHES AND AQUATIC HERPETILES TEXAS BIG THICKET ATBI 2007

Scientific Progress

Collections in 2007. Two sampling trips were made to the Big Thicket in 2007: March 17-24 and July 22-28. In March, fish samples were collected by seining from 3 localities: Steinhagen Lake, Harmon Creek, and an unnamed tributary of Sandy Creek in the Big Sandy Creek Unit. In July, additional samples of fish were collected from the unnamed tributary of Sandy Creek and Sandy Creek itself. In both cases, all collected fish were necropsied for recovery of parasites. Parasites were killed, fixed, preserved, and transported back to my laboratory at Peru State College, Peru, Nebraska, where identification of parasites is ongoing. At this date, approximately 70% of the specimens from the March collection are processed and identified; processing of the specimens from the July collection will proceed through the fall and winter months of 2007 and 2008. Although specific identifications are lacking on most specimens at this time, a rough estimate of parasite species recovery was generated for the March and July samples. Table 1, below, contains the relevant summary data from these estimates.

Estimates of Species Diversity. The proposal estimated that between 20 and 40 parasite species would be recovered from preliminary sampling in 2007. The above data are consistent with this prediction. Extrapolating from the above summaries to an estimate of total parasite species in the ~140 species of fishes and aquatic herpetiles in the Big Thicket is tenuous, but that estimate would be between 238 and 280 species. This also is consistent with the prediction from the proposal that approximately 250 species reside in these vertebrates. At the present rate of

parasite species recovery, between 6 and 7 years will be required to complete the field collection aspect of an inventory of these parasites.

Weaknesses of the 2007 Survey. Persistent rains in both March and July of 2007 restricted sampling to very small streams and backwaters of lakes; larger streams were too high for collection. This limited the recovery of parasite species by preventing collection of fishes, turtles, and amphibians in larger bodies of water, where parasite species diversity is usually higher. It also prevented the collection of some target fish species that typically harbor high densities of parasite species and individuals but are found only in larger bodies of water. Thus, the above estimates of parasite species recovery are probably somewhat lower than the true parameter because sampling was restricted to areas with low densities of hosts and low total parasite species diversity. I anticipate increased species recovery in future years when conditions allow access to a wider variety of aquatic habitats.

Outreach

During the July collection trip, my ATBI work was combined with the efforts of the class members of the BIO 580 FIELD PARASITOLOGY taught by Dr. Tamara Cook at Sam Houston State University. The class included 10 students, all of whom are graduate students and four of whom are currently secondary-school teachers in Texas. The course had been ongoing for several weeks prior to my involvement; thus, the students had received a substantial amount of training in the process of collecting hosts, host necropsy, and the collection and preservation of parasites. The class participated in the collection and necropsy of fishes during two days during the week, and the overwhelming bulk of all the physical and scientific labor was conducted by these students. This constituted approximately 16 hours of research effort by each student. Also participating was an undergraduate student from Sam Houston State University and a PhD candidate from Texas A&M Kingsville. All were a great help to my efforts, and I included a list of their names in Appendix A as acknowledgement of their assistance.

Scientific Communication

A presentation entitled, "Biodiversity Inventory of Parasites in the Big Thicket," was presented at the 2007 Big Thicket Science Conference in Beaumont, Texas. The presentation outlined the long-term plan of sampling for this TWiG, detailed expectations regarding recovery of parasite diversity, and provided a brief summary of what was accomplished during the previous week of sampling.

At this time, no print publications are in preparation, press, or published as a result of the work in the Big Thicket. As parasite taxa are identified and survey data accumulate, peer-reviewed publications are anticipated, e.g., the description of new species, summary survey data, etc.

Expenditures

\$1,259 were available for ATBI work in 2007. Funds were spent on travel, supplies, and various other books, licenses, etc. In-kind assistance was provided by Drs. Tamara and Jerry Cook, who provided lodging and meals during both collecting trips and Sam Houston State University and the Field Parasitology class of 2007, who provided laboratory and field assistance. Copies of receipts are provided in Appendix B, a justification is provided below, and a summary of expenditures is provided below in Table 2.

The collection trip in March coincided with the Big Thicket Conference in Beaumont, Texas. Funds were used to register for the conference, to pay a ½ share of a hotel room, and for a meal at the conclusion of the conference (\$220.⁸⁸). A variety of supplies were purchased that are directly used in research efforts, including texts (road atlas, fish identification book), a Texas fishing license, and vials and vial storage for specimen processing, (\$410.⁰²). Travel costs in March included a coach class, round-trip, airline ticket from Omaha, NE to Houston, TX and ½ share of parking costs at the Omaha Airport for 12 days (\$429.⁸⁰). Travel costs in July included gasoline costs for my personal vehicle to and from Texas (\$188.⁵⁷).

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
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
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


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Application for Funding for 2008
